2023 STAFF SERVICE AWARDS PRESENTED

In December 2023, the Gabriel Dumont Institute celebrated our long-time staff at the Christmas lunches around the province. Staff service awards recognize staff who have worked with the Institute for increments of five years. The HR Department and the Métis Culture & Heritage Department work together to organize the awards on behalf of the Institute to recognize the long-serving staff who make GDI a success. This is the first year that the service awards have been presented since the pandemic, so the list of recipients was longer than usual.

GDI recognized 31 staff with the fiveyears of service award, 26 staff with the ten-years of service award, and 21 staff with the 15-years of service award. Additionally, the Institute was pleased to recognize our most longserving staff who have dedicated 20+ years to supporting GDI's mission. Seven staff were awarded the 20-year service award, two staff received the 25-years of service award, two staff received the 30-years of service award, and another two staff received the 35-years of service award — the highest honour.

The GDI Board expresses the deepest gratitude and appreciation to all our employees for their years of service. Without hardworking and innovative staff, GDI would not be able to deliver exceptional educational and career support to Métis across the province. GDI PARTNERS TO LAUNCH NEW INDIGENOUS EDUCATION DOCTORATE PROGRAM

Early this winter, Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI), in partnership with the University of Regina (UofR), launched a new three-year Indigenous Education Doctorate Program in Prince Albert, SK.

The Indigenous Education Doctorate program is a cohort and community-based program designed to provide students and communities in Northern Saskatchewan with advanced educational options. The program emphasizes Métis local knowledge, history, spirituality, culture, and how the locality interacts and is positioned within broader national and international contexts.

Overall, the program aims to provide students access to a full Ed. Doc program, stimulate collaborative community development by addressing local educational issues through Indigenous-centered coursework and practice-focused research; respond to professional development needs of school divisions and other educational groups outside of the normal geographical recruitment range of the University; and make an essential step towards our commitment to Truth and Reconciliation.

This 24-credit hour program also includes nine Indigenous Dissertation of Practice (IDIP) hours and offers students the flexibility to learn in class, on the land, and online. Fall and winter courses will be held during evening and weekends, and over summer courses will be held in person.

GDI is incredibly proud to offer this program in partnership with the UofR. After graduating nearly 1,500 Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP) Indigenous educators and 141 Indigenous Community-based Master of Education graduates, this program was a natural next step in pursuing and creating higher education opportunities for Métis people. The Indigenous Education Doctorate program is one of the first of its kind. It will ensure that Indigenous people are well-represented and have strong voices as decisionmakers and administrators in the education system.

The Indigenous Education Doctorate program opened applications in mid-November and will accept applications until February 15, 2024. Two open houses are scheduled to introduce prospective students to the program; one was held on December 4, 2023, and the second will be held on January 4, 2024. Registration details can be found on our website at www.gdins.org/events. The initial information session drew a significant audience, reflecting substantial community interest and highlighting the program's remarkable appeal.

The first cohort of Indigenous
Education Doctorate students will start
classes in July 2024 and are expected
to be a part of the Spring 2027
convocation ceremony.

MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS!

Now more than ever, making mental health a priority has never been more important. Statistics Canada reported that over 5 million Canadians aged 15 and older met the criteria for a mood, anxiety or substance use disorder in 2022, and half of them have not spoken with a healthcare professional about their mental health in the past year (Stephenson, 2023).

What can we do to help increase Mental Health awareness and the importance of looking after our mental health? Dumont Technical Institute has been working on a Mental Health Initiative for our students. DTI created mental health support pamphlets full of great information and ideas about where and how to get support. We also have created mental health wellness boards throughout our campuses, focusing on

you and your mental health matter.

We want our students to know that they are not alone and that we are here to help. We may not have all the answers, but we can listen and will help get students pointed in the right direction to find the right support. Open and honest communication, active listening, and compassion can make a world of difference.

Keep.meSAFE is another mental health program DTI has available for our students. It promotes early intervention and 24/7 access to mental health support. Helping students manage their mental health so they can fully participate in academic life and complete their studies. Students can text or call to speak to a certified counsellor at any time, day or night, help is available.



We have recently started promoting Embracing Life, which is a suicide prevention initiative. Embracing Life has a free app where students can journal, have daily check-ins with themselves, create a safe space, and access resources available to them 24/7. The app has all the Saskatchewan emergency numbers for students who need emergent intervention.

Embracing Life has sent us wallet cards with all the Saskatchewan emergency numbers, along with suicide prevention stickers. The stickers can be put anywhere: doors, binders, laptops, water bottles, etc. These stickers are to make others aware that they can talk about their mental health struggles with the person who has the sticker. This is so students know who they can talk to if they are struggling, whether that be their Program Support Facilitator, Instructor, another student, or anyone with a sticker.

One step at a time, we will continue to work towards normalizing talking about mental health and increasing our support because you and your mental health matter.


