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LA RONGE CELEBRATES INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY-BASED MASTER OF EDUCATION PROGRAM GRADUATES

On July 25th, 2024, the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) and the University of Regina (U of R) celebrated the Indigenous Community-Based Master of Education Program graduates in La Ronge. The 13 graduates come from communities all over the north including Fond du Lac, Stanley Mission, Makwa, Beauval, Montreal Lake, Pelican Narrows, Cumberland House, Stony Rapids, and La Ronge.

The ceremony opened with a prayer in Cree by Elder Kelvin McKay, and a prayer in Dene by "Elder in training" and 2024 graduate, Joyce Torrie. Nick Daigneault, Mayor of Beauval, and Director of Northlands College hosted the evening with laughter and grace. Chief Tammy Cook-Searson of the Lac La Ronge Indian Band (LLRIB) brought greetings to the graduates and gifted the LLRIB graduates with star blankets to commemorate their accomplishments.

The Honourable Russ Mirasty, Lieutenant Governor of Saskatchewan was in attendance to celebrate his daughter-inlaw's graduation, and he shared a few words about the resilience and strength of Northern Saskatchewan with the graduating class.

Dr. Xia Ji, Associate Dean of Research & Graduate Programs, brought greetings on behalf of the U of R. She shared a personal story about the importance of preserving cultural heritage and teachings from her own family in China, and she advised the graduates that cultural work is equally important to their educational pursuits.

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DTI GRADUATES POISED TO ENTER WORKFORCE

Another successful year of professional skills training has concluded for Dumont Technical Institute (DTI). Since 1992, DTI has been training Métis students from across the province to learn a new vocation, enter the workforce and improve their local communities. In 2024, approximately 200 students graduated or were successful in their first year of studies from a DTI skills training course across the province.

In Regina, 15 students graduated with an Office Administration Certificate on June 28, 2024. Several graduates have already received job offers! Also, the Continuing Care Assistant (CCA) program celebrated four graduates on May 30, 2024. The Regina Practical Nursing (PN) program ended the 2023-2024 program year with 13 students working towards graduation in 2025.

In Saskatoon, five students successfully completed their Early Childhood Educator (ECE) Level 1 Certificate on June 28, 2024, and four graduated with their ECE Level 2 Certificate on May 10, 2024. Additionally, six students successfully completed all program requirements from the Heavy Equipment Operator (HEO) program on June 28, 2024. Training Métis healthcare workers remains a priority for DTI, and the CCA program celebrated five graduates on May 31, 2024. Meanwhile, there are 12 second-year PN students continuing to work towards their diplomas in 2025.

In Prince Albert, the CCA program celebrated five graduates on May 31, 2024, and the PN program will see eight students continue into year two of their program. Meanwhile, eight graduates from the Heavy Equipment Truck & Transportation (HETT) program received their certificates on June 21, 2024.

In the northern regions, seven CCA graduates received their certificates in Île-à-la-Crosse on May 17, 2024. There were five graduates receiving their Educational Assistant Certificate in La Loche. Also, 12 completed Driver Training in Green Lake, and seven received Chainsaw and Brush Saw Safety Tickets in Jans Bay. The Introduction to Carpentry – Home Build Program helped six students receive their Pre-Employment Carpentry certificates while helping the Île-à-la-Crosse School Division #112 build a home for future teachers.

The Outdoor Equipment Repair Program teaches the skills necessary to diagnose, maintain, and repair small engine craft such as wild rice harvesting boats. The program had 10 successful completers in Beauval, two successful completers in Buffalo Narrows, and five successful completers in Meadow Lake. Additionally, The Mental Health and Wellness program is proud to see 16 students continuing their studies into year two of their diploma program in Meadow Lake.

DTI graduates from all programs are poised to enter the workforce and start making a difference in their communities. DTI is proud to partner with many employers to help Métis graduates secure employment opportunities and meet the labour demands in their communities. The professional skills that each graduate has developed are complimented by the culturally affirming learning environment to understand Métis history and culture more deeply—a valuable perspective in any industry. From all the board and staff at the Gabriel Dumont Institute, we wish each graduate success on the next chapter of your journey and stay in touch with your roots.

practice criminal defence law.

Acting Program Head of University
Programming, Chantelle Jule, brought
greetings on behalf of GDI, reminding
graduates "you are joining a very
special group of educators, that are not
only teaching and cultural experts, but
are also leaders that are prepared to
focus on positive change in education."
These sentiments were echoed by Dr.
Morris Cook who gave a toast on behalf
of the faculty reminding students
about how important it is to have
strong Indigenous voices in leadership
roles.

Finally, the evening closed with toasts from four students offering gratitude for the past two and a half years of learning together. Danielle Pelletier gave the toast to her classmates with a personal dedication to each graduate, emphasizing the cohort's community strength. Joyce Torrie thanked the staff for their support from the administrators to the security staff. Michael Maurer thanked each

instructor individually for the wisdom they imparted, from time management to self-reflection and cultural teachings. Finally, Jacqueline McAuley gave the toast to family and friends who have supported the graduates throughout their academic journey.

This is the second La Ronge based cohort of the Indigenous Community-Based Master of Education program. The Master program has been offered in partnership between GDI the U of R, and Northlands College since 2019. This cohort is vital towards building an Indigenous circle of scholarship in Northern Saskatchewan who are dedicated to preserving language, culture, and Indigenous ways of knowing in the education system.

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ISET TRANSFER 2024

On April 6, 2024, Employment and Social Development Canada transferred the Indigenous Skills and Employment Training Program (ISET) agreement to the Métis Nation—Saskatchewan (MN—S). This agreement transfer is part of the Government of Canada's commitment to building nation-to-nation relationships with Indigenous governing bodies across Canada.

The ISET agreement offers employment services based on the needs and priorities of Indigenous peoples. Under the ISET program, Indigenous peoples can access a variety of funded and non-funded wraparound services to secure meaningful employment.



Since 2006, the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) has held the ISET agreement and delivered the program to thousands of Métis citizens at an optimal capacity rating. Last year, GDI distributed over \$12 million in funding and sponsorship directly to Métis students and clients. As a community-based organization, the Institute has 14 province-wide service delivery locations and provides an additional 37 communities with ISET-funded outreach services. Due to the longstanding success of GDI's delivery of the ISET program, the MN -S has subcontracted the Institute to remain the ISET service-delivery organization until the end of the ISET contract in 2029.
