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### **BRETT VANDALE NAMED NEW CEO OF GDI**

On November 14, 2024, the Gabriel Dumont Institute of Native Studies and Applied Research (GDI) announced Brett Vandale as the new Chief Executive Officer effective November 16, 2024. Former CEO, Lisa Bird-Wilson, resigned to pursue new opportunities in the arts sector, and the GDI Board of Governors appointed Vandale as the successor after he served as Acting CEO for the year 2023-2024 while Bird-Wilson was on leave.

Vandale is a familiar presence within GDI, as he has been with the Institute since 1999. He has a wealth of experience in Métis education and administration, including 19 years as the Director of the Dumont Technical Institute (DTI), several years as the Director of University Programs, and most recently as Acting CEO over the past year. Vandale has built strong relationships with the community,

academic partners, various levels of government, and within the Institute. The Board of Governors is confident it will be a seamless transition due to his long service, knowledge, and experience with the Institute.

"It is an exciting time for the Gabriel Dumont Institute as we continue to expand educational opportunities for the Métis in Saskatchewan," Vandale said, "We are grateful to those who cleared the way for our present success through their vision, advocacy, and leadership, and we look to a bright future of Métis excellence. I am humbled to be part of the legacy of the Institute, and I will strive to lead from a place of collaboration and accountability."

### **NSITEP SUCCESS STORY: LEAH MCCALLUM**

In 2024, Leah McCallum graduated from the Northern Saskatchewan Indigenous Teacher Education Program (NSITEP) with her Bachelor of Education degree, supported by her friends and family. Leah worked hard while in the program, and her passion for education is evident.

Before returning to school, Leah was living in Saskatoon with her two kids when she heard about an opportunity to take university-level courses in her hometown of La Ronge. She applied and was accepted to Gabriel Dumont College, where she earned two years of credits in arts and sciences. She found it easier to focus on the smaller classes, close to her family, who could support her. During that time, Dr. Morris Cook, the NSITEP Program Head, met Leah and encouraged her to apply for NSITEP and switch from Arts and Science to an education degree.

Leah said she started her first year of classes pregnant with her third child, but she remained dedicated to her studies. She said her instructors were understanding and supportive of her growing family, and she added, "They treat you like you're family; that's something different than any other program." Leah's two youngest children were born while completing her bachelor's degree, and she said that the instructors would help carry the babies around while lecturing so she could focus on her notes.


All her hard work paid off and, in her fourth year, Leah was invited to speak at a teaching conference in Calgary with Dr. Cook and instructor Gabe Andrews. She said the conference brought together Indigenous educators from all over, and she met several past NSITEP graduates who offered words of encouragement. Leah's presentation was about a grade unless you take the leap!



4/5 Treaty Education Unit, her thirdyear internship project. She shared her process for reflecting on how to make Treaties understandable to young children and how she landed on teaching what the Treaties symbolize. Her unit introduced students to the symbolism behind the Métis flag, animals, and ribbon skirts. She invited Elder Nancy Lafleur to speak to her class about her story skirts and how she chooses the symbols to represent the bigger message of that person's life. Then, the students could draw symbols for their own mini story skirts, which were displayed in the hallway of their school. Leah received the Order of Gabriel Dumont Bronze Award for her work helping students understand the symbolism behind the Treaties.

Leah has now secured a teaching position, and she hopes to get a Cree Language Learning Certification from USask and eventually pursue her PhD at Blue Quills. She said that she did not expect to be in school for six years, but she fell in love with everything about education. Her advice for anyone considering the NSITEP program is to not overthink it and just go for it because you don't know what the future might hold

# lamburger Soup

# Ingredients:

1lb ground beef

3 cans beef consommé

2 cups water

2 bay leafs

1 can mushroom pieces

4 diced potatoes

4 diced stalks celery

4 diced carrots

1 diced onion

2 cloves garlic

1 can diced tomatoes

#### **Directions:**

In a large frying pan, brown hamburger, garlic and onion then drain. Add can of tomatoes to pan. In a big soup pot pour consommé, water and bay leaves. Add diced potatoes, carrots, and celery into pot. Add can of mushrooms to frying pan. Boil until potatoes soften. Carefully add in frying pan ingredients, simmer for two hours over low heat.

#### Michael Jordan Ingredients:

1 Crunchie Chocolate bar, Crunch bar, Heath bar, Twix or Snickers.

1 cup broken pretzels

1 cup roasted almonds

8 ounces milk chocolate (good quality)

2 ounces dark chocolate (for drizzlina)

#### **Directions:**

Pre-heat oven to 350F (180C), and chop almonds and chocolate. In a bowl over a pot of water on low heat melt the milk chocolate, stir until smooth. Make sure the water doesn't touch the bottom of the bowl. Let cool slightly. In another large bowl, add the first three ingredients. Pour the melted chocolate until covered completely. Place heaping spoon fulls onto parchment lined baking sheet. Refridgerate to set. Melt the dark chocolate in the same way, and drizzle ontop of the set clusters before serving. Enjoy!

1 cup butter 3 tbsp icing sugar 2 cup flour 1 tsp baking powder


#### **Directions:**

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# NEW COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT RATIFIED

A new collective bargaining agreement (CBA) between the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) and the Saskatchewan Government and General Employees' Union (SGEU) was ratified in early September 2024, covering the period from April 1, 2022, to March 31, 2025. This new agreement marks the outcome of thorough negotiations, with both parties reaching a final memorandum of agreement (MOA) that was approved by the GDI Board in July 2024.

The process involved both extensive review and collaborative efforts between the Institute and Union representatives, culminating in the membership ratification that confirmed the agreement's implementation. Similar to previous agreements, the updated CBA includes a number of significant changes aimed at refining processes and enhancing employee benefits in alignment with GDI's mission and staff needs.

Outlined below are some of the substantial updates in the current CBA. This list is not exhaustive but highlights several key changes that will impact GDI staff:

The most substantive updates relate to monetary adjustments, including guaranteed wage increases that are retroactive to 2022. These increments consist of a 3% raise effective April 1, 2022, another 3% on April 1, 2023, followed by a 2% increase on April 1, 2024. In addition, a notable adjustment to northern allowance rates has been implemented to better align with our sector partners and public services rates.

To support career development, the CBA now includes an annual supplementary payment for employees who hold a master's degree while holding a position with a Bachelor's degree requirement. Documentation proving completion will determine eligibility for this benefit.

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Classification updates within the CBA now include additional classification including reclassifying roles such as "Employment Counselors" to "Career Advisors." These changes aim to more accurately reflect job functions and create consistent categorization across the Institute.

Updates in the CBA include revisions to the discrimination clause to reflect current legislation. To further support workplace transparency, a newly established complaint procedure provides defined timelines, confidentiality protocols, and an option for mediation through Saskatchewan Labour Relations.

Leave of absence benefits have also been expanded in this agreement, adding provisions for various types of leave, including interpersonal violence leave, elected office leave, foster parent leave, and parental leave. In order to support and encourage internal advancement, employees seeking out-of-scope positions now have access to an in-scope leave option of up to 12 months, allowing them to retain their seniority while seeking advancement opportunities.

An increase in the maximum sick accrual banks from 125 days to 150 days and a new flexibility in pension contributions—allowing employees to set their rate at either 7.5% or 8% starting January 2025—further enhance benefits for GDI staff.

In closing, representatives from both the Institute and the Union worked collaboratively to develop an agreement that supports both the cultural priorities and financial objectives of the Institute and its employees. GDI anticipates continuing this valuable partnership through April 2025 and into future negotiations.

Past CEO Lisa Bird-Wilson has served the Institute for 27 years of her career during which time she has authored several books, including An Institute of Our Own: A History of the Gabriel Dumont Institute in 2011. "I strongly believe in the integrity and important work of the Institute, and my commitment to Métis-specific cultural and educational opportunities remains unwavering" Bird-Wilson said, "I will continue to support the Métis in my new endeavors, and I humbly carry forward all that I've learned."

GDI's Board of Governors has resolved to begin Vandale's contract as the CEO of GDI on November 16, 2024. "We are pleased to welcome Brett Vandale as CEO for the Gabriel Dumont Institute after working closely together over the past year," said Wendy Gervais, Chair of the GDI Board and Métis Nation—
Saskatchewan Minister responsible for GDI. "We trust his knowledge of the Institute will ensure a seamless transition and the best outcome for all of our students, clients, and staff."

Vandale and Bird-Wilson worked closely to manage the transition. The first action of Vandale as CEO was to represent GDI at the Louis Riel and Métis Veterans Honour Day at Batoche National Historic Site on Saturday November 16th, 2024.
